	Cllr. Taylor reminded the meeting that it had been promised the weed control/highways liaison would be discussed and this will be placed on a future Network Panel agenda. In the interim Members had been given access to a paper that outlines the strategy Cornwall Council is following for its own managed lands. He had also been advised that they will try to get comments from the Environment Team. Depending on what is said, Cllr. Taylor will still press for a competent representative to attend so we can quiz them.

	d. Village Hall Committee (VHC) – the hall and recreation ground continues to be widely used by our community and is financially healthy. More events and regular usage of the hall have started back but the maximum number that can attend at any time remains 60 because of the COVID-19 risk assessment. There is 1 trustee position available and anyone who is keen to join - especially someone representing younger age groups would be very welcome and could talk to any of the trustees or the chair. The hall's AGM is in November to which all are welcome. A review of the welcome use of the Ham field over the summer by children's parties was undertaken and some additional fencing will be place around the small pond and signage. The hall is reviewing how to best secure its service maintenance contracts. In February 2022 there will be a special trustees meeting to consider future vision, strategy, and plans to keep the hall and recreation ground useful to the people of Grampound with Creed.

Proposed Planning Reforms – Members **RESOLVED** to support Bodmin Town Council's proposal: Clerk The White Paper really goes wrong regarding unspecified amount of influence over design codes as a meaningful substitute for communities' ability to engage in the scale, distribution, type, and principle of development. Considering the very short consultation timescales set out in the plan-making process, it seems likely that a substantial proportion of new development across the country will default to the national design codes, in which local people do not have a say. We feel that greater strength in voice is via a collaborative approach to the problem and therefore welcome responses from other Parish, Community and Town Councils in Cornwall in respect of this matter. The Chairman of Bodmin Town Council's Planning Committee welcomes comments via written response to these concerns, although not restricted to just the issues listed above. We intend to collate the comments / responses along with our own comments with a view to developing a campaign for equality and a meaningful say in mass and other development proposals in Cornwall, admin@bodmin.gov.uk 127/2021 Approved Planning Applications – the following application had been approved by CC: a.
